How Can Colleges Benefits from ETPL?

Workforce Development Boards receive federal funds to support retraining dislocated workers. They <u>CAN</u> contract with colleges to provide this training

Benefits college students

- No cost access to high-quality programs with good labor market outcomes
- WDB can provide supportive services resulting in higher completion rates & increases in livable wages

Benefits colleges

- Enrollments FTES/SCFF or fees for contract education
- Higher completion rates because of supportive services SCFF \$
- Strengthen partnerships with WDBs
- Access to additional funding

Community Benefits

- Better labor market outcomes (essential for federal funding)
- Collaboration across WDBs and Colleges is an efficient use of state funding (generates better ROI)

Fmnloument Training Drovider List (FTDL) requirements are proventing these productive partnerships

How Did We Get Here & Why is ETPL Important?

ETPL is the one of the primary interfaces between training providers and WBDs (AJC

Administrators)

ETPL is: The Epitome of "red tape," making training providers jump through multiple unnecessary hoops in order to be put on "the list"

◆It's the <u>ONLY</u> list job seekers can use when selecting vital job training if they want to use federal workforce funds (WIOA)

Prevents ALREADY ACCREDITED Public CC and Adult School programs from automatically being listed - example

•Ultimately, if we do nothing it's the low income, job seekers/students who these programs were designed to serve who will suffer the most

- → Clear Frustrations by all stakeholders including WDBs for <u>YEARS</u>



ETPL Recommendations within the State's Control



- 7. *Eliminate the requirement for providers to collect aggregate (all student) program data.
- 8. *Establish a "conditional eligibility" status for newer programs or programs that are building a base of outcome
