

Evolution of K12 SWP Funding

Early Rounds

The initial funding rounds focused on establishing foundational capacity and building trust among stakeholders for sustainable impact in education.

Later Rounds

The subsequent funding emphasized strategic precision and equity-driven design, ensuring alignment with future workforce needs and regional economic goals.

What the Data Shows

System Leaders

Sustained investment in system leaders demonstrates trust and scalability across K-14 pathways, ensuring effective implementation of educational initiatives.

High-Skill Sectors

Growing intensity in Rounds 6-8 reflects alignment with high-wage, high-skill sectors, preparing students for careers in AI, healthcare, and advanced manufacturing.

Expanded Participation

Expanded partnerships with elementary, charter, and alternative education promote early exposure and equity, focusing on underserved students and enhancing educational access.

Equity & Access

Targeting disproportionately impacted students ensures equitable pathway design and support systems that foster inclusivity and opportunity for all learners.

Workforce Alignment

Aligning education funding with labor market needs creates stronger talent pipelines, ensuring students meet the demands of today's evolving economy.

Fostering collaboration among K-12, community colleges, and industry enhances coherence, aligning efforts to build a skilled workforce for future challenges.


