- 9:10 - 9:20am Advanced Transportation and Logistics in the South Central Coast Region and Beyond - Statewide Director, California Community Colleges, Jannet Malig, jmalig@cerritos.edu | www.atleducation.org

- By 2040 CA will be closer to greenhouse gas reduction goals.
 - Jannet shared the CA Air Resources Board and key legislation since 2018. The chart showed all of the transportation types and the year of compliance.
 - Phoenix Cars that makes shuttle busses was awarded a large grant with a Texas university to make autonomous vehicles.
 - In July Antelope Valley was awarded zero emission busses.
 - New rail lines between downtown LA and the Santa Clarita Valley.
 - The Advanced Transportation sector is mandated by legislation.
 - The sector website was displayed which includes available curriculum.
 - The Port of Hueneme will be impacted, and there will be growth opportunities for programs.
 - Amazon suppliers will begin moving closer to communities in order to accommodate Amazon Prime orders.
 - Average salary in the logistics area has moved from \$15 per hour to \$17.
 - Question about which departments fall into the sector --- automotive and business (for logistics).
 - Looking at more short-term training, there is specific funding AB118 through Employer Training Panel (ETP) funding which is a great way to upskill incumbent workforce and meet new employers. ETP is a good opportunity to work with fleets, and a good way to increase employer engagement.
 - Dave Teasdale has a STEM-related example of one-week curriculum for high school students.



- In the auto industry if a person is hired to a full-time position and has their own tools, the employer must pay 2X minimum wage. Because of financial resistance of employers, they should be encouraged to take on more internships.

- Robert Cabral reported that Moorpark College has a couple of new programs and Notices of Intent will be submitted soon. Robert asked if the consortium would prefer more detailed information when submitting a NOI. Luann replied that it isn't required.
- Luann reported that noncredit programs do not need to be brought forward to the region, but we would like to know about them.
- Luann reported that the region met with the statewide Technical Assistance Provider (TAP) for Contract Ed and we will be contacting colleges to update the contact list.
- Harriet shared that the purpose of opening up Strong Workforce Program funding for contract ed, (short term training in the new trailer bill language) is to collaborate in terms of being immediately responsive to industry needs while at the same time working with instruction to put new courses through for credit and noncredit. Must have clear data re: unfilled positions and partnership with employers who will commit to interview students for actual jobs.
- Credit for prior learning (CPL) policy at colleges is now mandated to be in place by December 31, 2020 and faculty must be involved in all work related to CPL . All should be factors when submitting new programs.

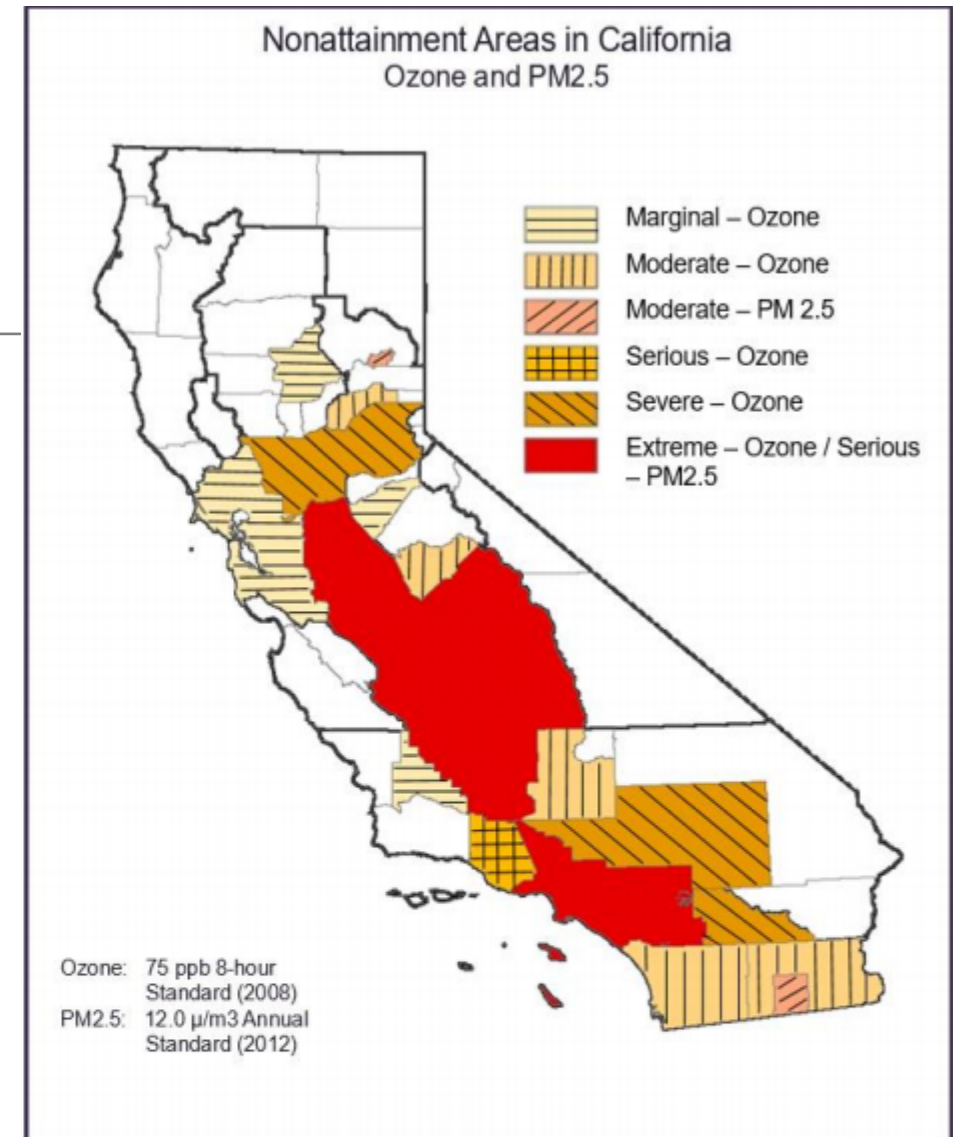
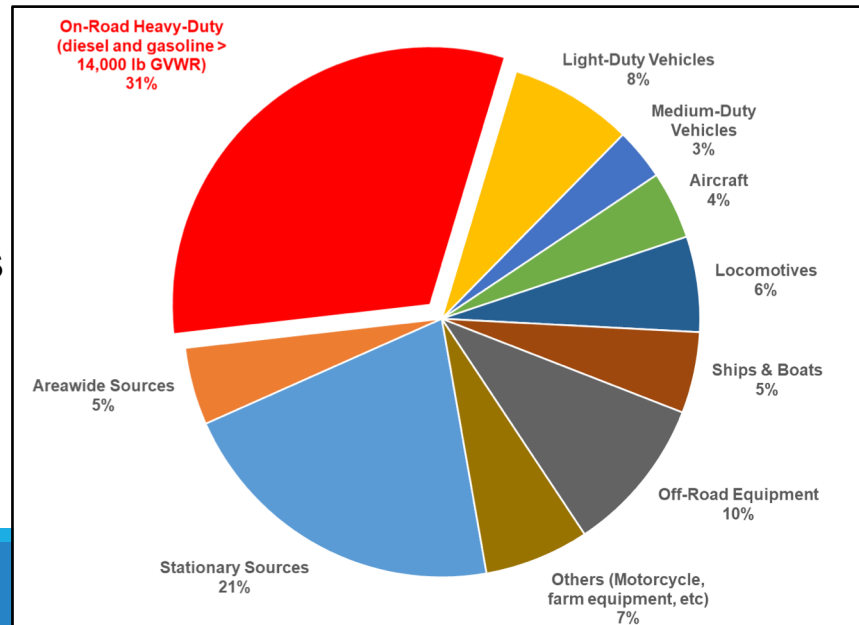

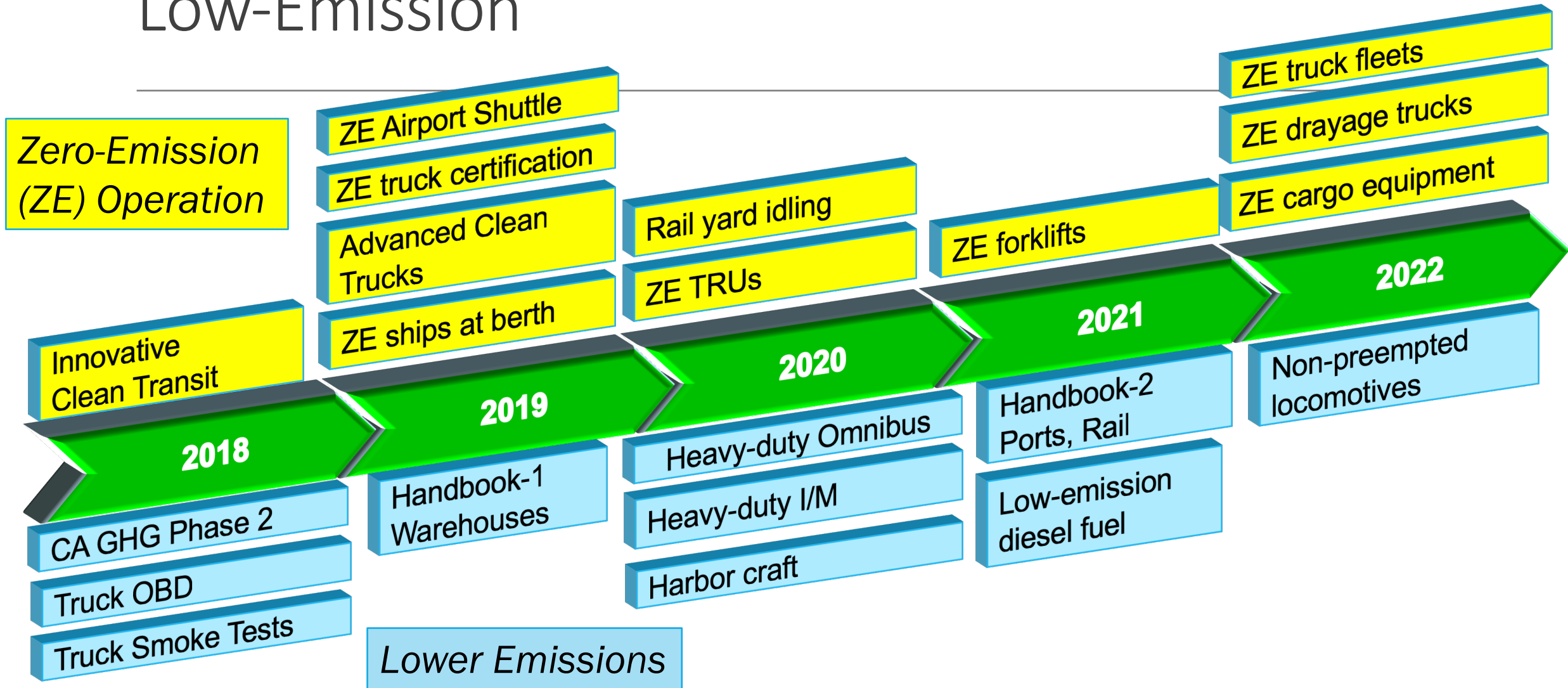
